




NPOs as intermediary sector between public authorities, family and market

NPOs are an important part of our society



Why is this sector so important to our society?





1. NPOs are a reliable social actor

They perform tasks that the state does not want to perform itself and they commit themselves to their concerns longterm and nation-wide.





2. NPOs are there when you need them

During extraordinary events such as floods or earthquakes they can mobilise people, organise materials and coordinate aid in the shortest possible time.





3. NPOs belong to the population


Due to the direct involvement of the population arises:

- a better understanding of the importance of the mission of the institution
- a control over the appropriate use of funds
- an immediate feedback on the services offered
- a greater trust




4. NPOs enjoy a high level of trust

NPOs are able to raise voluntary funds for the performance of charitable tasks.

5. NPOs relieve government spending

Thanks to performance contracts, the state administration has a great influence on the service provision of the sector.




Figure 1.9 Sources of nonprofit revenue, 1995 (22-country average)
